LOUISVILLE-ELIZABETHTOWN-SCOTTSBURG CSA

Combined Statistical Areas are groupings of predefined metropolitan (metro) and/or micropolitan (micro) areas to “represent larger regions and reflect broader social and economic interactions.”

There are 16 counties in the Louisville-Elizabethtown-Scottsburg CSA, five of which are within Indiana's borders: Clark, Floyd, Harrison, Scott and Washington counties. The other 11 are in neighboring Kentucky: Bullitt, Hardin, Henry, Jefferson, Larue, Meade, Nelson, Oldham, Shelby, Spencer and Trimble counties.

- **The CSA's 1.4 million residents ranked it 31st among the 121 CSAs** in the nation and fourth among Indiana's seven CSAs. Indiana's five counties contributed about 265,000 people to the population, or 19.5 percent. Since 2000, the Louisville-Elizabethtown-Scottsburg CSA has added more than 60,800 people, and the Indiana portion of the CSA made up about 20 percent of that growth. None of the 16 counties lost population from 2000 to 2006

- **JOBS:** The three largest industry sectors in the Louisville-Elizabethtown-Scottsburg CSA are manufacturing, retail trade and health care and social services, with each making up more than 11 percent of total jobs in the area. Of the three, only health care and social services saw a gain in jobs from the second quarter of 2001 to 2006, adding more than 8,800 jobs over that time span (an increase of 14.1 percent). Meanwhile, manufacturing and retail trade saw combined losses of more than 15,600. The same directional trends are visible at the state level as well — in both Indiana and Kentucky. The Indiana portion of the CSA actually added jobs in the retail sector from 2001 to 2006 while the Kentucky portion experienced losses. Despite losses in two of the three major industry sectors, the Louisville-Elizabethtown-Scottsburg CSA saw an overall increase in jobs of 1.6 percent over the five-year span. Compare this to a 0.3 percent change for the state of Indiana overall and 2.3 percent for Kentucky.

► LOUISVILLE METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA

WORK FORCE: The area has a higher proportion of residents of prime working age (age 25 to 44) than Indiana and the United States. However, the area (both as an entire metro and the Indiana portion) has smaller proportions in the three age groups for those less than 25 years old. This indicates that in-migration of people of working age in the years to come will be necessary to maintain those proportions.

- 52.8 percent of workers living in the Indiana portion of the metro commute, compared to 27.8 percent of workers living in the metro overall. While the Indiana portion of the metro may appear to be struggling in terms of its industrial composition, the overall picture shows that an increasing number of people are choosing to live in Indiana while working in Louisville, benefiting the overall metro economy.

- The accommodations and food services sector is one of the top three industries in Indiana's four metro counties (along with manufacturing and retail trade). This differs from the norm, where manufacturing, retail trade and health care and social assistance take any one of the top three spots. This could be part of the reason average annual wages are lower in the four Indiana metro counties (\$31,578), since accommodation and food services is the lowest paying industry in the area.
